TX-OK Kiwanian Seeks to Change The Hearts of Children & Stop Bullying

East Texas Kiwanian Jim Lord is a well-known storyteller. School children in several hundred schools throughout the states of Texas, California and Arkansas begin their mornings listening to Jim telling them stories of famous heroes from the

past and present while encouraging them that you don't have to be famous to become a hero. "Heroes are simply people who help others," he tells them. Whether the story of the day is about Danny Thomas who founded St. Jude Children's research Hospital, Clara Barton who started the American Red Cross, or Dr. Suess who has been instrumental in helping millions of children learn to read and use their imaginations, the common thread among heroes is helping others.

The other side of Jim's storytelling focuses on the opposite of a hero-a bully. Bullying is an international social epidemic and Jim's proactive approach to curing this huge problem is to begin even at the preschool level helping children understand that while heroes help others, bullies hurt others. So on the mornings that Jim is not giving the historical and social information about a real hero, he gives the kids a scenario where a child or group of children is acting like a bully and is brought back around in his thinking and behavior by his own peers or an adult. When given the simple choice of wanting to be a hero or a bully, children want to be thought of as heroes.

Jim is able to communicate these timeless Golden Rule principles to thousands of school children a day through his programs entitled **The Beginning of A Hero** and **Bully Alert**. Paid for by a variety of corporate sponsors, each participating school receives two CDs at the beginning of a school year

each participating school receives two CDs at the beginning of a school year containing enough stories from each of the two programs to play new ones each week for the 36 weeks of a typical school term.

Many schools invite Jim to actually present a live assembly for their students. He will tell you very quickly that this is his favorite part of the work. The children, already very familiar with his strong friendly voice, are eager to meet the man who has become their friend and encourager before they ever get to see him in person. Jim's assemblies are very unique. Teachers and school administrators explain that whereas many typical assemblies tend to be entertaining for students, the message intended is not always very clear. However, as Jim sings to the kids, tells them stories, even creating the illusion of a recording studio, he never leaves the subject that "heroes help and bullies"

hurt. Choose to become a hero!"



"The statistics about bullying going on in our schools is heartbreaking and absolutely frightening," Jim will tell you. "Thousands of kids a day in our country either don't go to school at all for fear of bullying or go to school traumatized by what they know is going to happen. It's way past the time for adults to take this social nightmare seriously. The fact that we now have the word *bullycide* in our language ought to make us sit up and take notice."


It's also a hard fact that schools everywhere are having to make major budget cuts. Though there are a very few schools on Jim's list who pay for the programs from their own budgets, nearly all depend on corporate sponsors to supply the funding The Tyler-Rose City Kiwanis club where Jim and his wife are members was the first club in the nation to begin sponsoring *The Beginning of A Hero* and *Bully Alert* programs nearly 10 years ago. Since then, many TX-OK District Clubs have joined in partnership with The Character Network, but hundreds of opportunities still await.

Immediate Past T-O Governor, Susan Hennum encourages ALL clubs to look into this. She says, "I can just see so many doors opening by having this bully prevention program in here, because I think it's just going to give them one more opportunity to make a positive choice in their lives..."

Jim Lord and The Character Network were initially introduced to the T-O District by Past Governor, Sam Curry. He says, "It is TRULY a Kiwanis program because it does serve our children." About his local area school district, he says, "...I hear nothing but great comments from our own school officials." He says some in his home club are closely connected with the schools, whether as a principal, a superintendent, or a sponsor of the club's leadership service programs, "...so they hear first-hand, and get first-hand the testimonies from the teachers--from the kids

of conversation," and that "The students look forward to hearing the stories on the announcements. It's an easy way for them to hear those stories; you don't have to convene the children in an auditorium." Ms. Czerwinski concludes by saying, "We highly recommend the program. It was an easy sell to our club, and since then I've shared with them how well it's working on our campuses, and they truly enjoy supporting the bullying program that Jim presents."




From his obituary it is plain that Gary loved his family. Our sympathies go to his family and especially to his wife of 38 years, Linda.

Jeffrey Wolff, The Eliminate Project vice chairman overseeing Service Leadership Programs for the campaign, reflects on his recent trip to Cambodia, a small country in Southeast Asia, to witness the efforts of UNICEF and the government to improve child health.



If you look through the images we use to promote The Eliminate Project, you'll notice they revolve around the mother and child, naturally, because that is the connection we are protecting. However, this isn't the complete story. What we don't see has been cropped out—the fathers, brothers, grandfathers and uncles.

In February, I was extremely fortunate to be part of a delegation that visited the Kingdom of Cambodia. We were given the rare opportunity to see many UNICEF programs throughout the country.

On our second day, we visited the Veal Ang Popel Health Center in the Kampong Speu province.

While visiting the health center, I noticed that most of the men were clustered together under a tree, off to the side of the facility. With an interpreter, I spoke with these men to find out their thoughts. Most were husbands, but there were also some brothers and uncles. Some had traveled long distances by motorbike or taxi (few people in Cambodia own cars) from their villages to ensure that their wives' or sisters' needs were being met. They were very thankful that organizations like UNICEF were helping ensure that babies were being born with a healthy start. Many of the men were taking time off from work to make sure that the women received the necessary care.

As a relatively new dad myself (I have two daughters under 3 years old), memories of the prenatal visits to the OB/GYN are still pretty fresh. I vividly remember the concern I always felt in the back of my mind that the pregnancy was progressing along safely and that both my wife and baby were healthy. These men were no different. It was clear to me that they had similar concerns about their wives and the health of their children.

Health centers like this one are where women come to receive prenatal care and—now even more often—to deliver their babies with a trained birth attendant. In 2007, only one in five women in Cambodia would travel to a health center where a trained professional would deliver their child. Instead, they would deliver at home, often in unsanitary conditions and by an unskilled traditional birth attendant. These babies and mothers would be at risk for tetanus and other diseases. Now, thanks to the efforts of UNICEF and its partners, four out of five babies are being born at health centers, and their mothers are receiving vaccinations and prenatal care.

Even though the state of prenatal care has improved and more babies are being born healthier in Cambodia, there is still a long way to go. We need to work together as a global community to ensure that children everywhere have a healthy start in life.

The 8th grade brought in 1,032 ounces of food and the winning 7t grade brought in 1,581 ounces of food for a grand total of 163 lbs. of food!



While you were at Mid-Winter, did you notice the table across from conference registration that contained all those neat items for sale? There were pens, postcards, t-shirts, cups, mouse pads, and more, all with the T-O name on them. These came from the District Store.

Laura is responsible for ordering the items, and she takes photos of them for the catalog. Lauren keeps the records, prepares the orders for shipping, transports the store to conferences and mans the display.

One of the items available through the store is a set of backpacks for Governor Ann's disaster relief project. \$60.00 buys six backpacks in a variety of colors or \$100 will provide the backpacks and the needed items to fill them. The office will store filled backpacks until there is a need. For example, T-O sent filled backpacks to Louisiana and Mississippi after Hurricane Isaac. Volunteers packed 120 backpacks which were delivered to the Louisiana governor and his wife for distribution in September. After Hurricane Sandy hit the northeast, 250 backpacks and the money to fill them were shipped to New York and 50 went to New Jersey.

Clubs can still get into the action with this project. Backpacks can be contributed to local first responders to be given to victims of fires and other disasters in their own communities. And who knows when the next widespread disaster will hit or where? Hurricane season is only a few months away, and we are already at the beginning of tornado season. Be prepared makes a good motto for all of us.


I would like to call to your attention Lynn Patterson, a member of the Paris, Tx Kiwanis Club in Division 32.

Kiwanians Support The Dell Children's - Circle of Care Pediatrics At Lake Aire Medical Center



The Kiwanis Club of Sun City Georgetown recently donated 600 Baby Readers, written for new parents and their new infants, to the Dell Children's - Circle of Care Pediatrics at Lake Aire Medical Center. The colorful rhyme books are given to the parents of newborns at their baby's two-week check up. Published in both English and Spanish, the Readers are hybrids of (1) educational pamphlet to parents on the importance of reading to young children, (2) illustrated rhyme books to read aloud, and (3) gentle advertising for community libraries and family resources.

The ongoing project of the Sun City club is part of their emphasis on literacy; they also distribute about 5,000 books a year to children in Head Start, and grades Pre-K through second in GISD and JISD every year. Twice a year club members take the books into the classrooms, read a portion of the book, and then distribute a copy to each child to take home and finish. A third leg of the literacy program is aimed at Georgetown middle school children. The club donates the books for the joint middle school program *Read it Forward*, sponsored by the Georgetown Public Library and the GISD middle school libraries.







