What A Difference One Day Makes

Is your club making plans to participate in Kiwanis One Day on April 21st? No? Do you think that one project on one day a year will not make much of a difference? If so, then read the following thank you letter sent to the Oklahoma City Kiwanis Club...and then think again.

I would like to share a little story with you. In the spring of 1947, at Chickasha, Oklahoma, a young mother died.

Among her survivors were two young daughters.

The girls stayed with family members for a few weeks, but by late summer it was apparent that the family couldn't or

wouldn't be responsible for the little girls.
One sunny morning in August, all the girls' earthly possessions were packed in a small cardboard box and the girls and the box were placed in the backseat of a car with strangers.
Away they went. They did not know where they were going and they didn't care.

In a few hours, the girls arrived in Oklahoma City at the Baptist Orphan Home at 63rd and Pennsylvania. The girls were separated and placed in cottages with girls their own ages. They had never been apart before and they were sad and afraid. It was hard to be "the new girl" especially for the little one.

The days went by and soon the talk was about starting school and the "Quance" picnic. The girls learned that every year all the kids went to the zoo and had a picnic. This was exciting. The girls had never been to a zoo, in fact, they had never been on a picnic. Finally, Saturday arrived and the children loaded buses and the adventure began. They could see all the animals; ride the zoo

train as many times as they wanted and the picnic...what a feast! They had hot dogs with yellow mustard, any flavor of soda you wanted and for dessert ice cream bars so cold they smoked when you took the paper off. And...they could eat as much as they wanted. At the end of the day when the children got on the bus to go home, some men would give them silver dollars. They would go home tired, happy and very rich.

As you have probably guessed by now, I am one of the little girls in this story and my sister Rose is the other. I am writing today to tell you that I learned the lesson that you taught by example.. I have been a member of the Tren-

ton, Missouri Kiwanis Club for almost 12 years and now it is my turn to serve the children of my community and I do it with great joy.

Rose and I were reminiscing about our memories of the "Quance" (Kiwanis) picnic. She still can see the smoking ice cream bars and I can still feel the weight of 2 silver dollars in my hand. You enriched my life in many ways. You planted a little seed deep in my heart, a seed of hope. You were a constant in my life. Without fail, you always found time to plan a picnic for us, year in and year out. It never changed and it was a comfort to me.

Today, I say thank you for the thousands of children you have helped. Thank you for being kind to my little sister. From the bottom of my heart thank you for making time for me.

Keep planting the seeds of hope. Thank you.





Dr. Bill Rauhauser's career included teaching, coaching, Assistant High School Principal, High School and Jr. High Principal, Curriculum Director, Assistant Superintendent and State Department Consultant. In 1987, after 17 years in public education, he started his own company and has conducted over 4000 workshops in 45 states, New Zealand, Europe, and Canada training school administrators in Strategic Planning. Bill has a B.A. from University of Northern Iowa, a M.A. from Truman State University in Kirksville, Missouri and a Ph.D. from Iowa State University, Ames, Iowa.

Bill's Kiwanis Experience started in 1975 when he joined the Kiwanis Club of Milford, Iowa. In 1976 he was elected club president. During his presidency, the club doubled in size and he was honored as a distinguished president. After a career move to Spirit Lake, Iowa, Bill was a member of the Spirit Lake Kiwanis Club.

Bill joined the Kiwanis Club of Robson Ranch as a charter member in 2008. He became President in 2008-09 and was elected Lt. Governor in 2009-2010. During his term of Lt. Governor, Bill was instrumental in building two new Kiwanis clubs and an Aktion Club in Division 39. He also was awarded T-O District "Most Valuable Lt. Governor Award" for 2009-2010.

During his Kiwanis career, Bill has been the re-

cipient of many other awards such as: Multiple years as a Distinguished Member, Distinguished President (2), Distinguished Lt. Governor, Robson Ranch Kiwanian of the Year, George F. Hixon fellow, C.T. Bush Award recipient (2). He is also a life-time member of Kiwanis International as well as the T-O Past Lt. Governor's Association. He is presently serving on the board of the T-O Foundation.

Bill tells his story like this...

"Growing up on welfare as the ninth of nine children and a single parent mom, (dad died when I was two) I developed a keen sense of what it meant to live in poverty. At 15 I dropped out of school, following in the footsteps of six older siblings. My high school football coach cared enough to come to my house, and he literally took me back to school. Every young person needs a positive relationship with a significant adult that does not practice self-destructive behaviors. Coach was that person for me. Kiwanis is all about the kids. That is why I have such a passion for changing the world one child and one community at a time."

It is because of his lifelong dedication to kids and education that Dr. Bill Rauhauser is seeking the nomination to the office of Governor-Elect of the Texas-Oklahoma District of Kiwanis.

Nancy Miller is well known because of her leadership to the National Society for Fund Raising Executives. and vision for the Texas-Oklahoma District. Not all of her achievements are told here, because there are too many for the space of one story. Unlimited to Kiwanis, her contributions to family services as well as civic and service organizations have brought her many honors and awards through the years.

From Abilene Christian University, where she graduated zations. with a B.S. degree in education, she was selected as Outstanding Education Major as a summer graduate in 1960, honored with an Alumni Citation in 1983 and received the title of Outstanding Alumnus of the Year in 1997. Later she served as member, then president on

both the Abilene Chapter and the National Board for Women for Abilene Christian University.

Nancy was born in Bonham, Texas and graduated from Bonham High School. After receiving her degree in education at Abilene Christian University, she continued her studies at Emporia State University in Kansas and earned a Master of Science degree in psychology.

Her work experiences from teacher in Abilene, Texas and Wichita, Kansas continued as a school psychologist in Mason City ISD in Iowa. Afterward, she served for five years as Director of Social Services at Maude Carpenter Children's Home in Kansas. Since 1972 she has served as director, president, and president emeritus of Christian Homes & Family Services in Abilene.

From the national organization of Christian Child and Family Services Association, she was honored as Outstanding Administrator in 1988 and received a Lifetime Achievement Award in 2004. The Abilene Chamber of Commerce, benefitting from her work on committees, named her Redcoat of the Year in 1989 and 1990. She also received "Outstanding" recognition in 1999 from

Her expertise in family relationships has cast her as speaker for seminars and various civic clubs. That background and her service on several advisory councils and committees are a plus for the youth in the K-Family of Texas-Oklahoma Kiwanis. It also has led to membership and officer in several professional organi-

Nancy Miller has been a member of the Kiwanis Club of Abilene, Texas since September, 1987, where she holds a 24-year perfect attendance record. She is the first woman in the Kiwanis Club of Abilene, Texas, the

> first woman president of that club, and the first woman lieutenant governor of Division 35. Texas-Oklahoma members elected her to two nonconsecutive terms as governor of the Texas-Oklahoma District.

She holds lifetime membership in the Texas-Oklahoma District and the Past Lt. Governors Association. She is a Heritage Club member and holds Walter Zeller, George Hixon and Harold Martin Fellowships as well as a Table of Honor. She has attended 20 Inter-

national Conventions and 22 District Conventions and has served as member and chairperson on numerous committees at local, district, and international levels. Added to her many credits and honors is the building and chartering of the Downtown Abilene Kiwanis Club in 2002.

As governor of the T-O District, Nancy made reading to children a project during one of her terms - reading in any form, through donations to libraries, reading to children, or other means. Her other term was aimed at membership growth, with a theme of "Just One". Those words promoted enlargement from the ground up, by individual members bringing one person, divisions building one club, and finally the district adding one division.

We asked Nancy why or how she joined Kiwanis in September of 1987. She said that she was attracted to us because of her career with a non-profit organization and learning, through it, of Kiwanis financial support of children's homes as well as projects with children's hospitals. Her job required working closely with children's hospitals.

It is not surprising, then, that one of her many positions in our District has been that of Children's Miracle Network chairperson.

Her Abilene club shares her enthusiasm for CMN and has recently seen the completion of an \$80 million project at Hendricks Children's Hospital, a part of Hendricks Health Center. The club donated \$50,000 for a teen activity room at the hospital.

Nancy's desire is to "give back to those who have given". She has done and is still doing just that.

Carlene Campbell is best known to fellow Kiwanians by her work as Disaster Relief Chairperson, but it is interesting to get to know other facts of her life and career.

Born on the Fourth of July at her grandmother's home in Marlow, Oklahoma, her birthday was often celebrated with fireworks and family gathered around. She attended school in Marlow through 7th grade and later graduated from high school in Central, Texas, after her parents bought the family farm just west of Marlow, homesteaded by her greatgrandfather. That homestead abstract was signed by the President of the United States.

After graduation, she married and moved to Duncan, Oklahoma, where she held her first job with the U.S. Department of Agriculture. From Duncan to Perry, Oklahoma, she continued to work for the U.S.D.A. and then to their state office in Stillwater in 1985, altogether working with the agency for 32 years. As a program specialist, she instructed farmers regarding farm bills. For her job skills, she was flown by the Government to Washington, D.C. in order to receive the highest honor given to an employee.

She remained in Stillwater until last year, when she moved to Edmond, Oklahoma to be nearer her children, daughters Gina Ellis of Oklahoma City and Mara Harmond of Douglas, Oklahoma, and her five grandchildren.

Carlene is an active member of Edmond Church of Christ, where she has been a Bible Class Teacher. She also has served on two campaigns with other Christians in the United States to invite people to services and Bible study.

Over the years she has been a member in Texas-Oklahoma Divisions 16, 19 and 40. Today she holds double membership in the Edmond Centennial and Oklahoma City Northwest -Casady clubs.

Carlene served the District as Lt. Governor in 1993-1994 and again in 1999-2000. She is modest when it comes to listing

honors, but an interview resulted in learning a few. The Stillwater club has presented her with a Tablet of Honor, and Division 16 selected her as layperson of the Year. The Past Lt. Governors Association presented her with its Youth Leadership Award. She is happy to have helped to build the Edmond Centennial Kiwanis Club, where she currently serves as president.

It is obvious that her love is for the Disaster Relief program of the District. As president of the Past Lt. Governors Association in 2003-2004, she made it her president's project. Learning of the Salvation Army's work in this area, she found that

> the program required more training in order for us to partner with them. The Army conducted a train-the-trainer class of 20 Kiwanians who became certified to conduct training for other Kiwanians. Then in 2004, Governor Gene Jantzen asked her to serve as Disaster Relief Chairperson for the District.

From October 2004 through October 2008, Carlene served in disaster relief during Hurricanes Ivan, Katrina, Rita, Gustav and Ike, also during the Oklahoma floods. In June 2007 she helped in the recovery of a teenager who had

drowned in a flood at Kingfisher. She reports that 121 T-O Kiwanians have assisted, in partnership with the Salvation Army, in situations involving hurricanes, tornados, floods, fires, and children compounds. There have been 30 training classes, resulting in 356 Kiwanians to assist in disasters.

During 2006-2007, as Disaster Relief Chairperson during Bill Crump's term as governor, she headed a successful campaign for our district to purchase a fully-equipped canteen truck. The truck, proudly decorated with Kiwanis and Salvation Army logos, is no located in San Antonio, Texas.

How did this 23-year Kiwanis start? It was because another Kiwanian asked her to join. He happened to be her Administrative Officer while she was employed by the U.S.D.A.

- 1) 3 issues published during the Kiwanis year

David Gale Rogers Celebrates 60 Years of Kiwanis Service

D. Gale Rogers joined The Galveston Noon Kiwanis Club back on March 15, 1952. The club met at the Jean Lafitte Hotel. One of D. Gale's first projects was an Easter Egg hunt, chaired by Sheriff Frank Biaggne. It was held on East Beach, near 7th and Boulevard. Hundreds of children attended and looked for Special Gold Eggs that were worth \$20.00 each. In the next decade. the club moved to the Galvez Hotel and was 125 members strong. Many of the club leaders were administrators and teachers with G.I.S.D., so education of underprivileged kids was a top priority. D. Gale remembers that Eddie Schreiber, who was one of the most popular Lt. Governor's in Kiwanis and was the Mayor of Galveston, kept Kiwanis alive in Galveston. All civic clubs enjoyed the weekly civic league bowling; and the Galveston Noon Kiwanis Club did well (except for those semipros from the Lion's Club!).

In 1975, the West End Kiwanis Club was formed and charter night was held at the Country Club. D. Gale transferred his membership that night and never regretted the move. Sometime later the club's name was changed to The Galveston Morning Club. Many fine people have led the Galveston Morning Club including D. Gale Rogers, who served as President in 1981. The club went the full cycle when in 2003 it merged with the original Galveston Noon Club and became The Galveston Kiwanis Club. D. Gale will tell you that all civic clubs have ups and downs and his club is no exception. The club's top priorities today is to keep members active and at-

tending meetings, working on projects and attending conventions and other Kiwanis club meetings to further knowledge of Kiwanis.


These past 60 years have brought D. Gale many Kiwanis awards: He received the Kiwanis Hixson award in 1997, the first one awarded to a Ki-

wanian from Galveston. Legion of Honor award in 2002, the same year he was given a Lifetime Membership to Kiwanis International and to the Texas-Oklahoma District. Many years D. Gale was awarded Distinguished Service Awards, Kiwanian of the Year, and Ruby Red Pins for recruiting new members into the club. D. Gale has recruited over 75 new members throughout the years. The best award he likes is the Top Apple Seller award which he receives each year for selling the most cases of apples for the club's fundraiser.

D. Gale Rogers has had many rewards over the years. One of them is his wonderful wife, Mary Jane, who has been at his side for all of these years. Texas-Oklahoma Sets August 9th Date For "I'm 4 Kids" Scramble

- The Texas-Oklahoma District Kiwanis "I'm 4 Kid's Scramble will be held on the courses of Clear Creek Golf Club at Fort Hood, Texas on August 9th, 2012. There will be a shotgun start at 0900. The tournament will be completed at 1400. The tournament will be a four person Scramble. Four person teams will play Deer Run and Panther Claw, two of the nine hole layouts on the Fort Hood golf course. At lease one member of Kiwanis must play with each foursome. Golfers may select their own foursome or rely on the Tournament committee to assign them to a competitive foursome.
- The cost of the tournament will be \$65 per person and includes green fees, cart rental and lunch. Lunch will be available in the clubhouse after the first foursome completes its round and turns in their scorecard. Each golfer may purchase two mulligans for \$5. Mulligans are optional and not required.
- Hole prizes will include longest drive for men and women, straightest drive for men and women, and closest to the hole on two different holes for men and women. There will be a longest putt made on different holes for both men and women, too. Each foursome will also have an opportunity to buy a tee box for \$10. Should a foursome take advantage of this opportunity, they will tee off about 150 yards from the flag on a par five hole. The foursome will be hitting their first shot on that hole. All prizes will be gift certificates for merchandise at the clubhouse; the top three teams in each flight will win gift certificates. Kiwanis Int'l President, Alan Penn, announced that the number of members needed to charter a new club has been reduced from 25 to 15! When the Kiwanis International leadership gathered in New Orleans for the recent Council meeting, they heard loud and clearly that the current requirement of 20 or 25 members is an obstacle in getting new clubs organized and chartered and that Kiwanis leaders want greater flexibility in building new clubs.

In response to this input, the KI Board voted to reduce the minimum number of members necessary to form a new club to 15, regardless of location. This is effective for clubs built on or after March 1, 2012. The Board is excited to offer this greater flexibility, because of the greater opportunity it affords. But it also brings greater responsibility. Those building new clubs must strive to develop an initial core of 15 high quality members who, with ongoing support, will continue to grow to a strong, enduring club of 25, 35, 50 or 100 members! We must all redouble our efforts to provide education, leadership development, and mentoring so that these newest members of Kiwanis become Kiwanians for life.

The Kiwanis International Board will be monitoring the progress and success of this change over the next few years. In the meantime, please help spread the word in your districts.

Project Partnership Clubs A Whole New Concept

By providing an alternative meeting time and place, a **Project Partnership Club (PPC)** offers Kiwanians in good standing the opportunity to participate in meaningful service, while in the fellowship of others, who have difficulty attending regularly scheduled meetings of their home club. In addition, this endeavor encourages two, or more, existing Kiwanis clubs to share the responsibility of supporting the efforts of the PPC. The intention is to magnify the service impact of the PPC membership and the growth potential of the existing clubs.

Essential Components

- ◆ The PPC meets one time per month at a time and place agreed upon by its members.
- Although an evening meal is customary in order to secure a meeting room, it is not mandatory and members are not required to participate in the meal function. Food and beverage is "pay as you go".
- Each home club of the partnership will furnish two members to serve as meeting hosts and to provide banner, bell, agenda, and flags for the monthly meeting. This responsibility is rotated among the home clubs of the partnership.
- While enjoying fellowship of other members, the monthly meeting provides opportunities to plan and coordinate upcoming service projects and to receive reports on the activities of home clubs.
- ◆ The official status of PPC members regarding dues payment, service credit, and attendance is maintained through the home club. There is no minimum attendance requirement. All funds associated with a PPC are to be handled through the partnership clubs for their respective members.
- ♦ The home club of new PPC members will be established at the time the application for club membership is submitted.
- The name of the club is to reflect the area served and be followed by the term "PPC".
- Should the number of PPC members in a given club reach minimum charter strength, members are welcome to apply to Kiwanis International for a charter.

Expectations

- The T-O District will provide 1000 business cards to aid in new member recruitment and will establish a website with suitable links to KI and the home clubs of the PPC.
- Guests are to be encouraged at PPC meetings and service projects. However, members are expected to pay for the meals of their particular guests.
- PPC meetings provide faculty advisors and parents associated with various Service Leadership Programs an opportunity to join a Kiwanis club and actively participate.
- The two Kiwanians representing a partnership club are expected to host the scheduled meeting. As host, this person represents the respective home club and is to provide the station property to conduct a Kiwanis meeting, manage the agenda, and return the station property to the home club.
- ♦ There is no need for a unique set of bylaws for the PPC, since the club is an extension of existing clubs and is governed by the partnership agreement of the home Kiwanis clubs.
