This deadly disease steals the lives of nearly 60,000 innocent babies and a significant number of women each year. The effects of the disease are excruciating - tiny newborns suffer repeated, painful convulsions and extreme sensitivity to light and touch.

To eliminate MNT from the Earth by 2015, 129 million mothers and their future babies must be immunized. This requires vaccines, syringes, safe storage, transportation, thousands of skilled staff and more. It will take \$110 million - and the dedicated work of UNICEF and every member of the Kiwanis family.

Kiwanis and UNICEF joined forces to tackle iodine deficiency disorders, achieving one of the most significant public health successes of the 20th century. Now, they are eliminating MNT from the face of the Earth. And in doing so, the project will reach the poorest, most neglected mothers and babies with additional lifesaving health care. The end of this one disease means the beginning of better health for so many families.

This project officially kicksoff during the 96th annual Kiwanis International Convention this summer in Geneva Switzerland, and continues until 2015 when Kiwanis celebrates its 100th anniversary.

The Project's campaign leadership team has been appointed. Randy DeLay from Houston, Texas, was named chair. Dave Curry from Butte, Montana, Sue Petrisin from Lansing, Michigan, and John Button, M.D. from Ridgetown, Ontario, were named vice chairs.

The campaign's international team will lead the largest fundraising campaign in Kiwanis' history. The appointment of the leadership team is the first step to building a worldwide team of more than 9,000 campaign leaders at the regional, district, division and club levels. The global team of campaign leaders will work in unity with the entire Kiwanis family to raise US\$110 million and help eliminate maternal/ neonatal tetanus.

The remaining members of the team are being identified in consultation with Kiwanis leaders from around the world. The complete committee will be announced in several weeks.

Each chairperson has a strong background in service and has held prestigious leadership positions at Kiwanis.

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
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


Governors' class of 2000-01, I am finding long lasting friendships to cherish.












